# LEADS AGAINST SUIT CONTRACTS HANDOUT

### WHEN TO LEAD TRUMP

## Advantages of Leading a Trump:

- 1. Reduce declarer trumping losers in dummy.
- 2. To reduce declarer establishing a long suit by trumping.
- 3. To cut down entries between dummy and hand.
- 4. Defenders may take more tricks by not being trumped by declarer.

### Disadvantages of Leading a Trump:

- 1. Leading trump helps declarer pull trump.
- 2. Defenders might have to take sure tricks right away.
- 3. Defenders may have to promote winners immediately.

### FOUR SITUATIONS WHERE A TRUMP LEAD WORKS WELL:

- 1. LEAD TRUMP WHEN DECLARER BIDS TWO SUITS AND DUMMY PREFERS SECOND SUIT.
  - a. To reduce declarer trumping losers in dummy.
- 2. LEAD TRUMP WHEN PARTNER PASSES YOUR ONE-LEVEL TAKEOUT DOUBLE.
  - a. Implies partner has length and strength in declarer's trump suit and has converted a takeout double to a penalty double.
- 3. LEAD TRUMP WHEN OPPONENTS ARE OVERBIDDING AND YOU HAVE MORE POINTS.
  - a. To reduce declarer from trumping defender's high cards when defenders have more high cards.
- 4. LEAD TRUMP IF DECLARER AND PARTNER ARE IN A LIKELY 4-4 TRUMP FIT.
  - a. To prevent cross-ruffing by declarer.

### WHEN NOT TO LEAD TRUMPS:

- 1. With an Attractive Alternative
  - a. Leading a solid sequence or touching high cards.
  - b. Leading a broken sequence
  - c. To establish defender's winners before declarer ruffs them.
  - d. Lead partner's suit to play winners early.
  - e. Lead a singleton, hoping for a ruff return.
- 2. If The Opponents Bid Strongly
  - a. Be aggressive, lead unbid suit(s) to find help in partner's hand.
- 3. When There is a Double Fit
  - a. Lead an unbid suit(s)
- 4. With Length in the Trump Suit
  - a. To run declarer out of trumps by making him ruff and lose trump control.
  - b. Lead 4<sup>th</sup> from longest & strongest suit to make declarer ruff & lose trump control.

# **OTHER SUIT LEADS:**

## CHOOSE THE SUIT:

- 1. A suit bid by partner.
- 2. A suit with a strong sequence.
- 3. A short suit.

#### CHOOSE THE CARD:

- 1. Lead the top of touching high cards.
- 2. Lead the top of a two-card suit.
- 3. Lead the fourth highest card.

#### CHOOSING A CARD TO LEAD IN PARTNER'S SUIT:

- 1. With a singleton, lead it.
- 2. With any two cards, lead the higher ranking KQ, Q8.
- 3. Holding the Ace, regardless of length, lead the Ace: A93, AJ4.
- 4. With three cards, lead the top of a sequence headed by an honor J109, 1092.
- 5. With only one honor, lead the bottom card: K82, Q54.
- 6. With four cards or more, lead the top of a sequence headed by an honor, and fourth best from any other holding.
- 7. Lead of a jack denies a higher honor.
- 8. Lead of a 10 promises 0 or 2 higher honors.
- 9. Lead King from AK doubleton. Never underlead an Ace unless a doubleton AK.
